PECAN, Inc. Progressive Education of Children in the Arts Network, Inc. is a non-profit organization that promotes the arts for youth. The mission of PECAN is to aid and support the development of children into confident human beings through participation in music and the arts.

Music and art for all youth are documented to be meaningful, purposeful, and productive activities that can help change a child's life forever by developing rhythm and structure, therefore helping the child gain confidence and self-worth.

The participation of youth in the arts offsets the attraction that would otherwise be met by alcohol, tobacco, and or drugs. Music and art therefore minimize or obviates the desire to resort to these substances.

PECAN, Inc. has been accomplishing its goal of promoting the arts in youth since 2001 through a variety of activities: Celebration of Children held at The Forum in Harrisburg in July, Art Day Camp held in Shellsville in June, Wheelchair Dance held in Hershey, and Caitlin's Smiles which continues to spread the creative arts for children in hospitals. These activities will be highlighted with more information in this newsletter.

What is Celebration of Children?

Celebration of Children is presented by PECAN, Inc. (Progressive Education of Children in the Arts Network, Inc.) Children up to 18 years of age are chosen from the area to perform their talent in dance, instrumental, gymnastics, voice, speaking and other specialties including creative arts. The purpose of the performance is to showcase talented young artists in the community to bring awareness of the importance of art to youth in the community. In addition to the performers, young artists also display their drawings, paintings, photography, sculpture and more at the art display in the lobby. The Allegro Award, Crescendo Award, Arpeggio Award, and Media Award are given out at this performance.

Wheelchair Dancers Experience the Joy of Movement.

Wheelchair Dance, founded by Nancy Ehrlich, Director of Celebration of Children and Board member of PECAN, Inc., began in June of 2005 with the help of her daughter Elizabeth. After years of dancing and then an accident that left her partially paralyzed and unable to dance, Nancy began researching wheelchair dancing on the web. Wheelchair dancing tones muscles, improves circulation, increases awareness of spatial relations, and increases socialization and self awareness while having fun! The goal is to make dance and the joy of movement accessible to everyone.



TASK - Theatre Arts for Special Kids

TASK is an all-inclusive non-profit organization under the umbrella of PECAN, Inc. The purpose of TASK is to give children of all types of ability a stage on which to express themselves. The goals of TASK are to give all children the opportunity through Theatre Arts to become more focused, be able to follow directions more accurately, cooperate with one another, communicate more clearly, display more awareness of their emotions, and the emotions of others, and to improve their self-esteem.

PECAN hosts the Youth Music and Arts Festival every July. It includes a fundraising performance, a silent auction of articles pertaining to the arts, work stations for learning arts and crafts and music, and food for sale. PECAN Inc. Awards

The Crescendo Award was created in 1998 by Cynthia Sudor, cofounder of Celebration of Children, to recognize an adult who has given of themselves using their artistic talent for youth in the Harrisburg area.

The Allegro Award, created in 2002, recognizes a youth who have given of themselves in the arts to help others.

The Arpeggio Award was created in 2004 to recognize a celebrity who is giving of themselves to help youth create harmony in their lives through use of the arts.

The Media Award was created in 2005 to recognize a program in any type of media that influences children in positive, productive ways by use of auditory and visual arts.

The Spirit of the Children Award - 10th anniversary award presented in 2007 to Cindy Sudor who was influential in starting Celebration of Children in 1998. and helped to market the idea of promoting the arts for youth.

Crescendo Award Recipients

1998 - Edward C. Truax - very active with Girls Incorporated of Greater Harrisburg, contributing his time and artistic talent to children and projects in the Harrisburg area

1999 - Linda Tedford - creator and director of Susquehanna Youth Chorale whose efforts have helped many children learn the value of harmony and team effort with the beauty of songs and performances.

2000 - Ruth ann Jeremiah - efforts with the group, ENERGY, since 1990 have helped children of all abilities and disabilities learn the value of song and dance as a group performing all across Pennsylvania.

2001 - Camille Erice - created the school Danzante to teach Latino arts and history to inner city youth.

2002 - Ali and Rafiyqua Muhammad - founded and direct the school Gnus which teaches African Dance. Ali Muhammad is also the founder and instructor with the Universal African Fighting Arts System.

2003 - George Kell - has made a difference in the lives of young people through his direction of musicals and plays at the Harrisburg Youth for Christ center on Eisenhower Blvd.

2004 - Cheryl Horning - created Caitlin's Smiles which delivers arts and crafts kits to children in hospitals. **2005 - Fred Miles** - Cartoon Tycoon offers an animation camp for middle and high school students helping many children learn the animation production process within a working studio.

2006 - Roni Dietrich - Scrimshaw artist / organizer of PECAN, Inc. Art Day Camp and instrumental in organizing the art displays for Celebration of Children for the past 5 years

2007 - Anita Tyler-Goodrich - founder/ director of Prazon School of Dance in 2000 to help the Arts.

2008 - Aileen Hower - makeup artist for COC for 4 years and volunteer for many organizations in the Central PA area.

2009 - Stan Baldwin - volunteers his time to organizations with his culinary, ballooning, and magic talents.

2010 - Popcorn Hat Players - Founded by Clark and Melissa Nicholson, they perform amazing interactive adaptations of classical tales, charming children into participation in the arts.

2011 - Paul Zerman, instructor for Akoustikos, a remarkable group of guitar students who perform at retirement homes and hospitals.

2002 - Lauren Elizabeth Fealtman - of Carlisle provided children with summer dance lessons for a small fee and donated the proceeds to the American Lung Association.

2003 - Randi Levundusky - worked 4 years with Cel. of Children coaching & encouraging youth in the arts. **2004 - Elizabeth Park** - contributed to non-profit organizations by face painting and working at summer day camps with visual arts for people with disabilities.

2005 - Andrew KJ Shiraki - president of the youth advisory counsel for the Lower Paxton Youth Center. **2006 - Elizabeth M. Ehrlich** - worked for 6 years with Celebration of children as MC and teaching dance routines. She is instrumental in starting Children's Wheelchair Dance and teaching the class.
